edge, the grain's direction shouldn't change. If it does, you can assume it is not solid wood.

WH&G: What should people look for when buying furniture?

"Solid wood" doesn't always mean solid wood. Be sure to use this test: give it a good rap. Solid wood sounds dense, not hollow. Push down on the floor of a drawer. There shouldn't be any give. Look for dovetailed corners and mortise-and-tenon joinery. (A mortise is a recess cut into a piece of wood to accept a tenon, which is a tongue at the end of a board that fits into the recess to make a strong joint.)

If you're looking at the surface of a piece of furniture, follow the line of the grain across the top horizontally. At the WH&G: How long have you been in the business?
